This month's newsletter explores some wonderfully illustrated books centering around Native American Heritage Month that Sarah found to be worth the read. Check out their picks below!






# Fry Bread by Kevin Noble Maillard


# We Are Still Here! by Traci Sorell

A group of Native American kids from different tribes presents twelve historical and contemporary time periods, struggles, and victories to their classmates, each ending with a powerful refrain: we are still here.


